New Mustang Daily editor, KCPR general manager chosen

Current M.E. Christine Kohn will head Mustang Daily

Christine Kohn, current managing editor for Mustang Daily, has been chosen as editor of the publication for the 1990-91 academic year. Kohn was one of three candidates who had applied.

Kohn, a senior journalism major, said the decision to apply for the top spot, was "a tough one," because of the time constraints the position imposes. She said her

dedication to the paper made her want to continue for another year.

Kohn interned last year at the California Journal, a political analysis magazine, and joined 19 other students from throughout the CSU system for an intensive study of state and local government and politics at CSU Sacramento.

She will continue to pursue her interests in political journalism this summer in Washington D.C., as one of 65 students nationwide chosen to participate in a six-week political journalism internship and attend Georgetown University.

The basic physical structure of the newspaper will not change, according to Kohn, but she hopes to add a number of new positions, including at least one paid full-time reporter to handle in-depth, investigative coverage.

Kohn also hopes to expand coverage of campus and city events by hiring a "freelance editor," who would be in charge of soliciting articles from the public and from students in journalism reporting classes.

Kohn will succeed current Mustang Daily editor Doug DiFranco. An editor for Summer Mustang has not yet been

Poly journalism deparment named CIPA headquarters

The Cal Poly journalism department has been chosen as the permanent administrative headquarters for the California Intercollegiate Press Association (CIPA).

The decision to choose Cal Poly as headquarters came at the educational organization's 41st annual convention March 1-3 in Long

CIPA is a non-profit organization that groups the student media from approximately 25 public and private universities in California. Currently 45 student newspapers, magazines and radio and TV stations are CIPA members.

The aim of the organization is to foster journalism education through annual mail-in and on-site news event competitions. In addition, student members hear noted speakers and attend innovative seminars.

Each year about 250 students and their advisors gather for a threeday meeting to compete in different media event categories ranging from hard news to features to editing and layout and design.

As administrative headquarters, the Cal Poly journalism department will house all CIPA documents accumulated through

The department will also be involved in membership drives. coordination of annual sites, and the maintenance of data banks pertaining to prospective speakers, seminar ideas and news event categories.

Dr. Nishan Havandijan, head of the journalism department, sees the establishment of a permanent CIPA headquarters at Cal Poly as a strengthening factor to the organization.

"Before this decision, CIPA records were passed from school to school in cardboard boxes," Havandiian said. "With a permanent headquarters, there will be more organization, and more strength for the group as a whole."

Havandjian will serve as executive secretary of CIPA. For the past two years he has been state faculty chair of the organization. In 1989, the annual convention was hosted by Cal Poly and held in San Luis Obispo. April Karys, editorin-chief of Mustang Daily for the 1988-89 school year, served as state president. Last year, Doug DiFranco, current Mustang Daily editor-in-chief, served as state Vice President for Special Projects.
